As I write this, I am preparing to be ordained priest in Salisbury Cathedral on Saturday 26 June by Bishop Nicholas. I will then continue to serve here as part of the Bridport team for the next few years. My journey to this point has been an incredible adventure. I have often had to step out in faith, not knowing exactly what would come next but being prepared to make the big moves so I could follow my calling.

I wonder whether you have ever wanted to take a big scary step in your own life but felt the risk was perhaps too high.

This was my feeling for quite a long time. Four years ago, when I was accepted to train with the Church of England as an ordained minister, I decided the risk was worth taking and moved with my three daughters to Oxford so I could start my training.

We packed up our house, said goodbye to our friends and family, then made the journey from Shaftesbury to Oxford. This was scary but so worthwhile, and I learnt so much about my faith during this time.

After I had finished my training, the bishop wrote to tell me I would serve my curacy in Bridport. Again we packed up our home, said goodbye to new friends, and made the move. We didn't know anyone here in Bridport but looked forward to settling into the community.

I have no regrets about this move. Bridport has been so kind to us and we have been welcomed into the community with open arms. We have met people I know will be lifelong friends and I have been able to start walking in my calling, enjoying my role within the clergy team here.

Why am I telling you this? Because sometimes taking those big scary steps, where the risks seem way too high, is worth it. I had a huge advantage in that I was able to trust

that God was guiding my choices and this was my calling. But I also know from my experience of being a Christian that we all have callings, and we all have gifts and experience to offer others. Often it's not the skills that we lack but the confidence to believe in

ourselves and step out.

I honestly never thought

when I first felt called that five years later I would be sitting in my vicarage garden preparing to become a priest. I thank God every day for giving me the strength, for sustaining me during the difficult times, and for putting amazing people around me on my journey.

I think we're all very fortunate living in Bridport; there's something unique in the way we 'do'

community, something incredibly special about the way we care for one another and welcome new people to settle and become family with us. I'm excited that as we come out of lockdown I will be able to meet more of the amazing people in this community and share opportunities to gather and to celebrate the wonderful place where we live.

I also encourage any of you who are sitting at home today wondering about stepping out and taking on new adventures or experiences to listen to those around you, to trust your instincts and to step out in faith. You never know where God will lead you if you trust in him.

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D-Day commemoration marks death of US soldier

This year's service of commemoration for D-Day on 6 June was led by the Revd Pete Stone at Mountfield House, beside the memorial to US soldiers stationed in Bridport from November 1943 to June 1944.

During the service, local historian Jane Ferentzi-Sheppard spoke about one of those soldiers, Staff Sgt Ray Lambert, who died in April this year at his home in North Carolina, aged 100. He was one of the last surviving soldiers from the first wave of the D-Day invasion of Omaha Beach.

Ray was an army medic and his medical detachment was housed in the Literary and Scientific Institute in East Street and houses in Barrack Street, while other American soldiers were billeted in Walditch (including Ray's brother, Bill) and in Mountfield House.

Ray was just 23 on D-Day, 6 June 1944. He was wounded twice in the morning but managed to save more than a dozen men before finally suffering a broken back and being put on a boat back to England. He is pictured above (on the right).

Support for life beyond lockdown

As we emerge from the restrictions of the last year, Seeding our Future is holding a workshop where people can consider how they will use their unfamiliar freedom.

The event will offer a hopeful, supportive space for exploration, harvesting the lessons of the pandemic, and forming a vision of a hoped-for life, both as individuals and in the community. There will be processes for exploration, sharing time, skills, tips and a simple ritual to help each person step into the future.

The workshop leaders are Alan Heeks and John Harley. Alan is behind the Bridport cohousing project and the Bridport Food Matters initiative on food security, while John is a facilitator, drama therapist and Unitarian minister.

BTM churches move forward to a new pattern of worship

The Bridport Team Ministry (BTM) is starting a slightly different pattern of services this month as lockdown restrictions ease further. The new schedule includes Sunday services at all six BTM churches.

The changes come partly in response to the results of a recent BTM survey designed to give the clergy a snapshot of how

worshippers feel about returning to church after lockdown. Churchgoers were asked where they regularly worship and what is most important to them in gathering as a community of faith. More than 130 people returned the survey form, and 70% of respondents said they would like to attend church every Sunday. Asked about the factors they consider in deciding which service to go to, more than 40% said the location was most important, followed by style of worship (31%) and the service time (20%). Just over 65% said they would be prepared to attend another church if their usual church was not open on a Sunday, and more than 90% said they would understand the need for changing the time of the Sunday service. Currently 44% attend a mid-week service as well as or instead of on a Sunday.

"Going back to church after lockdown restrictions relax doesn't mean going back to normal," says the Revd Deb Smith, Team Rector. "We can't go back – we have to go forward. For members of our congregations, everything changed overnight last year when our churches had to close. The experience of lockdown has been tough, but we know we can learn lessons from this period of upheaval. It has forced us to think about how and why we gather, how we can be more appealing to families, how we might explore a range of styles of worship at different times and on different days, and how we can continue online, too, and welcome those who choose to join us in that way."

From July the churches at Bothenhampton, West Bay and Walditch will each be open for services of Holy Communion twice a month. On the other two Sundays congregations will have time to explore new ways of gathering.

At Bradpole services will take place at 9.30am every Sunday, alternating services of Holy Communion and Services of the Word. At St Swithun's there will continue to be a 9.30am Eucharist service each Sunday.

At St Mary's Bridport there will be a weekly 8am service of Holy Communion from the Book of Common Prayer, and at 11am Holy Communion three Sundays in a month and a Service of the Word on one Sunday.

The number of mid-week services has grown since lockdown. Some of those will end, but others have been thriving and will continue.

The full schedule is shown in the table on this page. The new pattern will be reviewed after six months.



Two community grou

The combined forces of the Bridport Community Fridge and Garden Glut have been a real lifesaver during Covid – a source of free, fresh food for hundreds of people across the town, many of whom suddenly found themselves struggling. We take a look at how these valuable initiatives came into being...

One of the simplest ways to help someone in need is to give them food, and that's just what Bridport Community Fridge has been doing for the last three years. The organisation is run from the Chapel in the Garden by a team of volunteers and is the perfect example of a 'win-win': feeding hungry people and preventing surplus food going to waste.

The Fridge opened in April 2018 after a year of planning and forging links with local shops and suppliers. It works with FareShare, a national network of food redistributors operating in partnership with several supermarkets (in Bridport this means regular donations of surplus food from Waitrose) and has also made independent connections with the

Co-op and Morrisons plus local shops including Leakers and Rise bakeries and Washingpool Farm. Members of the public also make generous donations of food and money, which all helps the Fridge to continue its valuable work.

"We've been really well supported by the local community," says Lizzie Harley, student minister at Bridport's Chapel in the Garden, who has been involved from the start. "We complement what the wonderful food bank [Cupboard Love] does, but we're not a food bank and people don't need a referral to get help from us. I want to take the stigma away from needing free food – absolutely anyone can come to us, and they do – and of course we're saving good food from being wasted. I'm really proud of the whole thing."

Adapting in a pandemic

Before Covid, the Fridge was open as much as possible – often six days a week, depending on what food was available – at the Chapel in the Garden in East Street. The pandemic, however, brought inevitable restrictions. During lockdown the Fridge couldn't open to the public, but volunteers made deliveries and rerouted food to people who were cooking for those in need.

In September organisers teamed up with Bridport Garden Glut to open a

ips feeding the town for free

weekly stall in St Swithun's church car park on Thursdays, and it soon became extremely popular – there was often a queue at opening time. Hot, fresh meals were sometimes available alongside the two groups' usual offering, as restaurant owners who weren't able to open their own premises cooked free food for the public instead. The stall is continuing as Covid restrictions are relaxed.

"We're now open two days a week at the chapel, too," says Lizzie. "People can't come inside, so we have a table at the door, and this summer we're having a gazebo so we can serve teas. We really want to open at the chapel as much as possible, but being able to have the stall at St Swithun's has been wonderful during Covid."

The Fridge was originally a joint initiative between the Chapel and NHS mental health resource START (Support, Transition and Recovery Team) and it came about when Sarah Jones, who works for the team, realised that volunteering for a community project could aid clients' recovery. The mental health benefits of the Fridge have spread far wider than this, however, as Sarah explains. "It's turned out better than I'd hoped," she says. "Working at the Fridge has brought people together, and those who come along to collect food also get the chance for a chat, maintaining connections and helping to prevent isolation.

"I approached the Chapel to work with us because it's a very supportive place and could provide an existing hub of support, but really it reflects Bridport as a whole. The town is a truly compassionate community, where volunteers come forward naturally to help others. I've seen community fridges elsewhere and they're not quite like ours!"

Bridport Community Fridge is now usually open on Tuesday and Saturday mornings at the Chapel in the Garden, East Street, but please check their Facebook page for updates. Food from the garden

Bridport Garden Glut is another group that's busy keeping the town fed and preventing food waste.

It started at St Mary's School last year, giving away produce from the edible garden there during the lockdown closure and summer holidays. When the school re-opened in September, however, the group had to find another outlet, and this led to the stall at St Swithun's, where it now works hand in hand with the Community Fridge.

The group has adapted and grown amid the restrictions of Covid. "Now people bring us surplus fruit and veg from their gardens and allotments," says volunteer Peter Wilson. "We started by wanting to help people in a crisis, and we had no idea how it was going to work, but it's been great. There has been so much support for the stall and people have volunteered week after week – that shows the strength of our community."

The Glut has used its
Thursday stall at St Swithun's
to promote healthy eating
and has suggested ways to
use the produce it gives away.
Sometimes hot food is given out
with a recipe and instructions
on how to prepare it at home.
Dishes have included pizza and
veggie lasagne (pictured).

Bridport Museum asks: is this The Right Stuff?

Bridport Museum is marking its reopening with a brand new exhibition asking visitors what they value about the museum and its collection.

'The Right Stuff' is an exciting three-and-a-half-year project that seeks to engage the local community in helping to shape what the museum collects now and into the future. The brief is bold: what should the museum keep, and why?

Museum Director Emily Hicks says: "The museum has around 20,000 objects in its stores, many of which are of national and international significance, such as our rope, net and fossil collections. We display only about 5% of them, and the rest are a challenge to manage, costly to maintain and in some cases, difficult to justify. We want to ask some tricky questions: why do we have certain things? Should we have them? If not, where should they go? We also want to create space for future collections – how would Bridport like to represent itself for future generations?"

'The Right Stuff?' introduces visitors to some of the



challenges that the museum faces in caring for its collections – with lots of opportunities for people to have their say! It runs until the end of this year and entry is included with a museum ticket (just $\pounds 5$ for a year's pass).

This project is funded by the Museums Association and by the Esmee Fairbairn Collections Fund, which helps projects that develop collections to achieve social impact. www.bridportmuseum.co.uk

Trading Standards is fighting to stop illegal dog imports

Cropping dogs' ears and docking their tails has been banned in the UK and most of Europe for many years, although sadly there is still a demand.

To exploit this, a Dorset man set up a company called UK Dobermans and claimed to be able to source doberman puppies from Romania that would be cropped, docked and delivered to the UK. These puppies cost up to £3,000.

Dogs being imported from the EU to the UK must be a minimum of 15 weeks old, while dogs from outside the EU must be at least seven months. It was long suspected that the owner of the business was importing dogs from outside the EU but Trading Standards (TS) couldn't prove it.

In 2019 a UK Dobermans consignment of puppies was stopped at the Eurotunnel with Serbian (non-EU) microchips. They appeared far younger than seven months, which meant TS could execute a warrant on the business, revealing that nearly 200 dogs had been brought in with false papers. The owner was sentenced in May this year to 28 months in jail.

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

From the village editor

This month we remember Saint Fiacre, the patron saint of gardeners and herbalists. He was Irish-born but died in Breuil, France, in 670 AD, having created a renowned vegetable and herb garden and cared for the sick and disabled at a time when such people were outcasts in their society. Throughout the medieval period herbalist monks and nuns provided necessary medical care for the sick in their society, especially the poor and destitute. *James Craddock*

Two groups contributing to the beauty of Walditch

The Walditch Garden Group is a monthly informal and friendly gathering of Walditch and non-Walditch residents with the common interest of our gardens.

Over coffee or tea the group members discuss plant or garden problems and successes and share ideas, plants and seeds. All are very welcome to come along to meetings. All being well with the proposed lifting of restrictions, these meetings will have resumed on Thursday 24 June at

10am in Walditch Village Hall. Posters will be displayed on Walditch noticeboards with any updated information.

There is also the Walditch Churchyard Conservation Group, which looks after the area around St Mary's Church. The group's Walditch Living Churchyard Project aims to enhance the existing flora, increase the range of appropriate wild flowers, encourage insect activity and improve the attractiveness of the site for birds and small mammals.

Volunteers have been making progress with this project for the last three years. The allocated area is small and is in three sections, including a long bank, so provides differing growing conditions. The project team has worked hard, developing a management plan, making monthly records and welcoming the interest from other conservation and wildlife groups.

The rare find of the pink waxcap fungus ('pink ballerina') last December was a 2020 highlight, confirmed by a fungus expert and now entered into county records. Wildflowers, grasses and insects are recorded monthly. These are displayed on the Walditch church noticeboard, but if anyone would like further details or has questions or comments, please do let the team know.

From the parish editor

When the beaches are full, rivers are good, cool places to head for. St Swithun's is between two rivers – the Brit and the Simene – and much of the space between them is clothed in fizzying colour and texture. There are brimstone, citron and occasionally blue butterflies, and a slow worm basking on the woodland path reminds me of those of us who like to sit peacefully or in meditative pose on the back pews.

By the river, pied wagtails feed their young while perched on ash wands. White petals flow along the river's current, pairs circling each other in an anti-clockwise dance. Germander speedwell – known as 'St Mary's wort' in Ireland – grows at ankle height, showing its blue eyes, and in the fields wheat, corn and potato furrows are in evidence. Rose campion and buttercups in equal number dazzle the attention along from the ancient sheep dip.

Tubular comfrey florets are there, in colours from lilac and blue to pink and deep mauve, reminding me of the lane in



Abbotsbury that's lined with a startling parade of various hues. Meanwhile, scents of philadlephus (mock orange) and roses delight and carry us on our way.

St Swithun's day is 15 July. Born around 800

in the kingdom of Wessex, he was Bishop of Winchester from October 852 until his death in July 863. He is now the patron saint of the city and its cathedral.

From the minister

Many years ago I was part of a group that met in our United Reformed Church in Billericay (which sounds as if it's in Ireland but is actually in Essex). We sought to work together by offering worship and fellowship in mutual support for those of us with young families. Yes, I said it was many years ago!

Anyway, I remember at one session a reflection by one of the group on the way that geese fly and why they do so in the well-known 'V' formation. This boiled down to the fact that leading from the front is extra tiring for several reasons.

First, there is the physical explanation. Apparently there is greater wind resistance at the front of the V and the leader meets it head on, breaking it up to some degree and creating a slipstream in which those following find it easier to fly. I suppose it's the same for Formula 1 drivers who do likewise.

Second, there is the psychological burden of deciding the rate and direction of flight, which together add to the tiring effect of being at the front.

My friend explained that the geese deal with these challenges in two ways, the first of which is sharing the burden of being leader and taking it in turns to be at the front (in much the same way as cycling teams do in competitions such as the Tour de France). Also, as they fly, the geese at the back encourage those at the front. This apparently explains the constant honking as the group flies overhead, which translates as: "Go on, Dave, you're doing a great job!" and "Hey, Janet, keep it up, not long until someone else takes a turn."

This memory led me to realise that church life is not dissimilar. All leadership roles, whether they involve leading worship, offering musical input, maintaining the buildings, beautifying the church with flowers or managing the rotas, take time, effort and jolly hard work. It's good, then, that the jobs are shared and others within the church fellowship take a turn in sharing those burdens, just as the geese do. And it's good when folk, having taken a rest from a role, feel refreshed and can stand again and offer their time and gifts.

Not only that, it's good to say thank you, to encourage folk in such positions and tell them what a great job they're doing. I am amazed how many lovely emails, phone calls and comments of appreciation I've received for what the

church has been able to offer during these last difficult 15 months or so and I want say how much they have meant.

In turn, I'd like to express my own appreciation for what others have done, from delivering or preparing written services, phoning and supporting each other when we couldn't meet, preparing the church for re-opening and offering additional

stewarding and cleaning once we could. So, on the basis that I don't suppose a honk would do the job, can I just say a huge and heartfelt thank you, friends! Let's keep the goose model going, shall we?

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
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
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
