A time of more questions than answers

'Where is God in

the pandemic?

Out there

on the front

line, suffering

and dying to

bring healing

and hope'

Oh what a beautiful morning! Cue for a song? Perhaps not; maybe the best song for a day like today is the birdsong of spring. The sun is shining, the temperature is getting warmer and the bulbs have started to burst out, heralding the end of their winter hibernation.

I look up to the blue sky, with wispy clouds floating by, and across this beautiful image are the recognisable white lines left by jet aircraft taking people off on their first holiday for a couple of years, thanks to that hated word – lockdown. Are we really there, on the other side of this pandemic? Or are we starting to learn to live with this virus?

The last couple of years have challenged us, in so many ways, to reevaluate what really matters both to us personally and to our world. It wasn't so long ago when the 'impossible' became reality. Who would ever

have believed that one volcanic eruption would bring European air traffic to a standstill? Yet in April 2010, an Icelandic volcano did just that for several weeks, at a cost of more than £3 billion. Only three years ago, who would have believed you if you'd said that a worldwide pandemic would bring the whole world to a standstill for nearly two years, and that schools, colleges and universities would close, with children and students being educated at home? But here we are, still trying to guess whether we can safely book that much-needed foreign holiday.

Who would have believed that a 100-year-old man would top the pop charts and raise around £34 million for the NHS, simply by walking up and down his garden. Who would have believed that a profoundly deaf person would win Strictly Come Dancing, and then head a movement to persuade parliament to make British Sign Language a legally recognised language in the UK?

It all makes my head spin! There are so many more questions than answers: Why and how has this happened?'

So many green spaces in our beautiful town!

This month I visited Bridport Community Orchard's site at St Mary's Church Field. It's an oasis of calm just off South Street and I realised how truly blessed we are to have so many green spaces right in the middle of town.

The orchard and the allotments alongside it are another Bridport institution that benefits from the

work of volunteers, who turn up in all weathers, don their wellies and roll up their sleeves to get stuck in to whatever needs doing. The rewards of their labour include the joy of working the land in the short term and a bumper crop of apples (weather conditions permitting) in the long term! Turn to page 8 to read more about the community orchard. Who is to blame? When will it end? Where will I be safe?

I recently read a book called 'God and the Pandemic', which helped me focus on the positive aspect of this chaotic time. To quote the author, Tom Wright:

"Actually, the best question I've heard in the last few weeks has not been the question 'Why?' It's been the question 'What?' What can we do? In the UK, the government asked for volunteers to help the National

Health Service with all the extra urgent non-specialist tasks.

Half a million people signed up almost at once – so many it was hard to find appropriate tasks for all of them. Retired doctors and nurses have come back into the front line. Some have themselves caught the virus and died.

"They are doing what the early Christians did in times of plague. In the first centuries of our era, when serious sickness would strike a town or city, the well-to-do would run for the hills (part of the problem was often low-lying, foetid air in a town). Christians would stay and nurse people. Sometimes they caught the disease and died. People were astonished. What was that

about? Oh, they replied, we are followers of this man Jesus. He put His life on the line to save us. So that's what we do as well.

"Nobody had ever thought of doing that kind of thing before. No wonder the Gospel spread. Even when the Romans were doing their best to stamp it out...

"Jesus doesn't need church buildings for His work to go forward. Part of the answer to the question, 'Where is God in the pandemic?' must be, 'Out there on the front line, suffering and dying to bring healing and hope'." Coral Hatton, licensed lay minister

St Swithun's Church renewal programme makes progress

The current St Swithun's building will celebrate its 200th birthday in 2027.

To celebrate, the congregation has been looking at a building programme – 'Repair & Renewal', or 'R&R' – to fit it to serve God and the community for the next 200 years.

The steering group is looking for volunteers to join its working team. It needs a treasurer, fundraisers, and people to help with publicity and communications and with the church and civic permissions systems. Organisers promise that no offer of help will go unanswered.

"Our vision is to be a busy, active, outward-facing lighthouse for the people of Allington, the wider community of Bridport and the Bridport Team Ministry," says Philip Sturrock, chair of the project steering committee. "Our mission is to celebrate our 200th birthday by modifying our lovely church building to make it more welcoming, visible, accessible and flexible."

As well as considering the St Swithun's building itself, the project team has looked at the church's community outreach, its external site, its liturgy and other forms of worship. The actions they are considering include:

- making the building more visible through the garden;
- making more parking spaces;
- installing glass doors at the entrance to make the interior visible from the street;
- creating a 'welcome area' to greet visitors;
- creating more flexible seating to make a different, inspiring and practical space for use by the church congregation and others from the community;
- installing wifi and large screens to improve communication;
- creating a quiet area for private prayer or contemplation;
- overhauling energy use, aiming at a zero-carbon footprint;
- creating a paid appointment in the long term to realise the church's outreach potential.

"The principles behind R&R are summed up in the word SERVE," says Philip. "Security; environmental objectives; our relationship with God and the creation of a holy space; visibility – we want to be seen from the road, with better lighting; and engagement with the wider community."

Care for our planet by going green(er) for Lent





The Bridport Team Ministry wants to challenge Bridport to go green(er) this Lent. The Revd Deb Smith, Team Rector, writes:

How can we all do our bit to become better at caring for creation and improving our lives and the lives of others through healthy, eco-friendly

and sustainable living? Coming up is the season of Lent – the 40-day period before Easter – and we can all use this as a chance to reflect on our impact on the environment. Perhaps

we could each commit to an action that brings a real benefit to nature and helps address climate change, whether that's giving something up or taking something on.

In the Bridport Team we plan to challenge one another through Lent to consider how we might use the traditional season of prayer and fasting to live more sustainably in an area of our life.

We have been inspired by the Christian charity A Rocha UK, which works for the protection and restoration of the natural world and is committed to help churches care for the environment.

Here are some changes you could make to join in. Take time to reflect and consider these options – pick one or two or however many you'd like (you never know, the changes might just stick!) Make this part of your prayerful keeping of this season, too.

- Go plastic-free. Even if you can't become totally plastic-free, make it your goal to at least reduce your use of plastic.
- Switch off from digital. Explore technology-free times or areas of the house, switching to 'airplane mode' for the first hour in the morning and the last hour at night. Or try 'switch off Sundays', doing something creative or reaching for your Bible over your device(s).
- Boycott fast fashion. Buy less, or buy secondhand. Why
 not support pre-loved and charity shops, reusing lovely
 things instead of always buying new, cheaply produced
 throwaway clothes? Or clear out your wardrobe and offer
 old favourites to friends or take them to the charity shop or
 online marketplaces.
- Buy local or in bulk. Support our local shops and businesses, favour Fairtrade items or bulk buy some products to save on transport and packaging.
- Become zero waste. Slowly try to reduce your waste a bit every week. Consider giving a homemade gift instead of buying a present. Try upcycling items or looking at your food shop and seeing what items you could buy differently, spending a bit more on loose fruit and veg, for example.
- Spend more time in nature. Aim to leave the car at home and walk more if you can. Make time to get out into the beautiful places we are so blessed to have on our doorstep. Being outside is so good for our mental health and helps us connect with God as Creator.
- Invite wildlife into your garden. In some of our churchyards, groups have been encouraging insects and bird life by leaving areas of land wild. If you have a garden, how could you get involved in this? Find out how to encourage wildlife.
- Try a plant-based recipe or diet. Start by cooking yourself vegan or plant-based meals once a week and go from there.
- Grow your own. Whether you have a garden or a windowsill, find out what you can sow and grow each month. These are just a few ideas to think about. We are all different: what matters is that you take the first step. So choose a change to make – be gentle on yourself and realistic, but challenge yourself too!

Rudyard Kipling's poem Eddi's Service, from which this book takes its title, is a set of verses put into the mouth of Eddius Stephanus, St Wilfrid's earliest biographer. Keep safe – register your appliances

The UK Association for the Manufacturers of Domestic Electrical Appliances (AMDEA) is asking people to register their household appliances to keep homes safe.

Both new and in-use appliances can be registered through the scheme, allowing people to be contacted more quickly if their appliance is ever subject to a safety recall. Consumers can register appliances with the manufacturer or online at www.registermyappliance.org.uk.

Many manufacturers allow owners to register appliances up to 12 years after purchase. Landlords also need to make

sure that products in their rental properties are covered. If the renter has not registered the appliances they own, landlords can do this.

Contemplative Church grows in popularity

From April, Contemplative Church will be meeting twice a month after services have gathered a growing community.

Services have been running on the first Saturday of the month since September, but from April they will run on the first and third Saturdays.

Contemplative Church – which operates from St Swithun's, Allington – grew out of a small group who practise contemplation getting together to explore prayer and silence. Services are at 6pm from April to October while in the winter months from November to March they start at 4pm instead.

The Revd Dan Shackell explains: "Contemplative Church is an inclusive meditative worshipping community, seeking to be 'church' in a different way than is traditionally experienced. We want to offer a safe space to all to experience silence using a simple practice of meditation."

Everyone is welcome to come along. The services are held in St Swithun's Hall and usually last for around half an hour. Refreshments are served afterwards.

The Queen's Green Canopy

The Queen's Green Canopy is one of the many ways the UK is celebrating Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee this year.

It's a UK-wide tree planting initiative hosted by Cool Earth, an international charity for halting deforestation and fighting climate change, supporting local communities who want to manage and protect the threatened forests they live in.

The Prince of Wales is the patron of the project, which is a partnership between the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (DEFRA), Cool Earth, the Woodland Trust, the Royal Horticultural Society, Trees for Cities, the Forest Canopy Foundation, the Cavendish Group, the Conservation Volunteers, the Tree Council and the Community Forest Trust.

Cool Earth provides advice, assistance and commemorative plaques to councils and groups planning Jubilee trees. Its board includes the Head Forester of the Duchy of Cornwall, Geraint Richards; the Director of Cool Earth, Matthew Owen; and Lord Frank Field.

Here in Bridport, the Bothenhampton & Walditch Parish Council has approved the planting of a tree at the Howard Road Amenity Site in Lower Walditch (more details on p10) and is considering planting another at the John Holt Play Area in Bothenhampton. The community orchard that's the apple of Bridport's eye!

At Bridport Community Orchard (BCO), nature is preparing herself for the seasons ahead.

It might look like nothing much is happening, but just below the surface every tree is waiting to burst into life, using the energy stored over the winter to produce leaf and flower buds that will open in April and May. Then, by September – sooner for some varieties – the first apples will be ripe for harvesting, ready to be eaten, cooked, or squeezed for delicious tangy juice.


BCO's main site is St Mary's Church Field, behind the parish church on South Street. It's owned by Dorset Council and leased to Bridport Town Council. Way back several centuries ago this area was used for drying rope, then in the 1700s it belonged to the Priory Mill and was probably gardens or orchards. It later became allotments, then land for grazing animals, and finally fallow meadowland. Losing land like this to development is always a possibility, but early this century a building plan was rejected after local campaigners called for the site to be retained as a green space, and in 2006 this designation was enshrined in the Bridport Local Area Plan.

That's when the idea first popped up for a community orchard in the town,



inspired by the Symondsbury Apple Project and with help and advice from its organisers, David and Kim Squirrell. Talks between representatives from Bridport Town Council, the Bridport Environment Group and orchard advisers Treewise Cooperative resulted in the formation of the Bridport Community Orchard Group.

Planting began in January 2009 with 23 half standard trees, and a further 35 were added in February 2010. There are about 45 apple varieties plus three different pears, two gage fans, a black mulberry, a quince and most recently a damson. That early planting also



The site is designed to be as wildlife-friendly as possible, and also now includes an enclosure with three beehives – one of the traditional type plus two 'top bar' hives – an impressive composting system and a pond. A triangular area of the orchard has been left to form a wildflower meadow and doesn't get cut until the seeds have fallen, then it's scythed in the traditional way. The species that grow here include yellow rattle, which parasites itself on to grass, keeping it to a minimum and giving other flowers a chance.

Not just fruit trees

Three of the adjacent allotment plots are run by BCO, too, and these are a valuable resource for people who want to learn how to grown vegetables and those who don't have a garden of their own. There's a polytunnel, put up at the beginning of last year, and a smart new shed for storing tools. Some of the money for these projects has come from community grants, including one from the West Bay Car Boot Fund, which supports groups in Bridport and Dorchester. BCO has recently applied for another grant from this fund to replace some of its raised beds.

All this takes quite a lot of looking after – particularly outside the dormant winter months – and that's where the volunteers come in. "We're always

looking for volunteers," says Jenn Baker, chair of BCO. "We have a pool of between 150 and 200 people, including a core of about 25 stalwarts who come most often, but we'd love to have more because there's so much to do. Some volunteers have specific jobs — there's a tree pruning team, for instance — but people can just turn up and they'll be given a job. We have our own tools so people don't need to bring any unless they want to."

Orchard work parties are held on the second Sunday each month from 9am and are organised by Ian Bark, treasurer of BCO. Jenn runs the allotment sessions, which are held from 2 to 4pm on the first Thursday of the month during the winter (end of October to mid-March) and every Thursday during the rest of the year. There's a small charge of 50p per person for the allotment sessions, which goes towards seeds, plants and compost – but volunteers do get tea and biscuits!

BCO has a second orchard, Jubilee Green, at the end of Park Road on the lower slopes of Allington Hill. The group has been looking after this site since 2012, the year of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee (hence the name) and it has eight fruit trees, a large ash tree over a small copse, a range of native trees and shrubs including an established weeping lime, and some open grassland. Much of the planting here was funded by the Lions Club of Bridport as part of the Lions' international tree planting project. There are four voluntary work party sessions each year at this site.

A social space

For several years BCO has held regular events at the St Mary's Church Field orchard, and will hold its popular Mayfest 'in the flesh' this year after the





Covid-enforced virtual festival in 2021. May Day has been celebrated across the UK for centuries, marking the arrival of spring and its longer, warmer days, and Mayfest is the perfect opportunity to see the BCO trees in full blossom as well as to enjoy traditional music, dancing, food and all-round merrymaking!

Looking less likely, however, is Apple Day. This national celebration of the fruit and its many uses was designated as 21 October by environmental group Common Ground in 1990, and BCO hold their Apple Day event - the group's main fundraiser – on the closest Saturday. "That was cancelled in 2020 and 2021," says Jenn, "and it doesn't look like we'll be holding it this year either. Some of our volunteers have drifted away during the pandemic and we need new committee members to help with running things and planning events. We do hope to hold the event again, though, in future years.

"However, we do still need to pick the apples, so we hold juicing sessions in the orchard around that time, where people can come and have a go at making juice.

Last year we filled 200 bottles; one of our volunteers pasteurises the juice and we sell it on the market, where it's always popular. We keep some back to use for hot mulled juice at our wassailing event in January, when we sing and recite poems to the trees to encourage a good harvest in the coming year."

Mayfest is on Monday 2 May from midday at the St Mary's Church Fields off South Street.

There's more information about BCO and its events online at www. bridportcommunityorchard.org.uk and on the group's Facebook page. If you want to volunteer for a work session, you can just turn up, or send a message through the website first if you prefer.

The orchard is a public amenity space and is available for use by other groups. In the past two years, yoga sessions, choir practice and school activities have taken place in the central circle. Please contact BCO via Facebook or the website, where there are more details under Policies & Management in the main menu.

From computers to church: one minister's journey of faith

In the pod this month is the Revd John Yarrien, superintendent minister for Dorset South & West **Methodist Circuit. Since October** his responsibilities have included **Bridport United Church (BUC)** and Uploders Methodist Chapel, following the retirement of the Revd Peter Clark. He lives in Dorchester with his wife, Cora.

The Bridge: What are your earliest memories of your Christian faith?

John Yarrien: My earliest memory of faith is standing as a five-year-old in Ely Cathedral in Cambridgeshire, breaking out in song in the nave, singing Away in a Manger – in the middle of summer! I remember the feeling of awe, wonder and peace as I stood looking up at the sky – and as I pointed up, shouting: "God's up THERE, Mum...?"

TB: What drew you to the United Church?

JY: Well, to be honest, I was 'sent' by the Methodist church to Bridport United Church. When I arrived the first thing I did was tuck into one of their famous 'big breakfasts' and I knew I would fit right into this welcoming and hospitable church. More seriously, the congregation's heart for opening the doors, coming alongside and serving the community in Bridport shone through, and I knew God had called me here to build on the wonderful work already being done, through a ministry of enabling and encouraging.

TB: How do your own life experiences

TB: How do your own life experience help you in your work as a minister?

JY: Before I entered ministry I worked as an IT consultant for Hampshire County Council, and was responsible for the computer systems used by a possible of Children's Services, I was a bit like JY: Before I entered ministry I worked for the computer systems used by a part of Children's Services. I was a bit like a of Children's Service. I bridge, a translator between the techy



IT teams and the 'client'. At the time I had no real idea that God was equipping me with some really important skills in terms of 'change management', which we do a lot of in ministry, as well as both being part of, and leading, a team. I was nicknamed the 'agony uncle' of the office because I used to chat and listen to colleagues in the office kitchen, and it was amazing to me what people shared and sought counsel about. Now, in ministry, I am called to sit with folks, listening to them at points of joy and points of desperation in their journeys of life and faith, and this is such a privilege. I loved my IT job and found it a nurturing and supportive work environment, but looking back I realise I never felt as at peace as I do now, doing a job I feel called to do, serving God, church and community.

TB: What makes Christianity relevant to our way of life in 2022?

JY: In our world, turned upside down by Covid-19 and with the rising costs of living, I believe people are seeking truth and certainty and are trying to find their place in the world. Christianity offers the truth and certainty that God holds all things in his hands. He created all things, and whether or not we know that truth for ourselves, God loves each one of us. At the heart of Christianity is community

and the truth that all are welcome. In a difficult period in our global lives, we need more than ever to be 'in community', so we might share the joy, hope, peace and love that Christian community and faith in Jesus Christ offers.

TB: What's your favourite part of the job?

JY: It's the moment when I've preached a sermon and a member of my congregation comes up to me at the end of the service and says "you know when you said... well that got me thinking..." Then I know that, for that person, God has connected my words with their lives and experience, and they are changed, or something has shifted in their thinking and on their journey of faith.

TB: What do you like to do in your spare time - if you have any?

JY: Cora and I have two lively labradors, Rolo and Poppy, and we love finding fields and waterside walks for them. They love nothing more than chasing after a ball or sloshing in the water. I love films, and although we haven't been to the cinema much lately, we've got caught in the warren of movies and shows on Netflix! And if I need to de-stress I assemble my clarinet and play for a few minutes. I get lost in the music, which really helps on busy days when I can't see the wood for the trees!

TB: Please tell us a fact about yourself that our readers don't know...

JY: In 2013 I spent a year in the USA as part of my training as a Methodist minister. In December 2013, Cora (then my girlfriend) came out to visit for three weeks. When we arrived in the Great Smoky Mountains, along the Tennessee/ North Carolina border, I popped the big question, and Cora said yes. We were married on a hot summer's day in 2014 at Southwell Minster, Nottinghamshire.

Owing to a lack of resources, the matter was only dealt with by the new Dorset Council at the end of January this year. Although the residents' association had submitted considerable detailed evidence, the council's planning committee did not approve the petition at their meeting but decided that the application did not meet the legal tests required by the Commons Act 2006 (although they did recognise the importance of the field to residents). Had the application been granted, it would have protected the land from future development; even though it is in an area of outstanding natural beauty (AONB) and currently outside the local development plan, this could be subject to change.

Primrose – pin or thrum?

The signs of spring are always welcome, and happily there is the prospect of having a good show of primroses in the Walditch churchyard conservation area by the end of March or early April.

Unless you have studied botany, primrose flowers are maybe a little more complicated than you might think. The flowers have an intriguing design feature that lessens the likelihood of the deleterious effects of inbreeding. The primrose has two types of flower, commonly known as pin-eyed and thrum-eyed. The pin flowers have the single female style, which supports the pollen-receiving stigma,



held well above the male pollenproducing anthers. In thrum flowers the arrangement is the other way round, with the anthers held above the style. All the flowers on an individual plant will be either pin or thrum. In sizeable plant populations the distribution in likely to be 50:50.

Broadly because of the manner in which pollinators collect nectar from the base of a primrose flower, long-styled flowers can theoretically only pollinate short-styled flowers and vice versa (though that is not infallible) but as we will see there are other mechanisms that provide backup.

Darwin was fascinated by the process and went on to study the primrose in some detail. He found that artificially pollinating pin flowers with another pin flower produced very little or no seed, and the results were similar when cross-pollinating thrum flowers. He then went on to study the flowers in microscopic detail and found other differences that also impede or prevent self-pollination. So, with these other safeguards, why bother to have pin and thrum? Botanists have puzzled over this and speculated that it may serve some other, as yet unidentified, purpose, not least because it also occurs with some similarity in 28 other unrelated plant families.

There is still another twist to the story. Owing to genetic accidents, a change in the DNA can result in a self-fertile primrose plant, which does not need to be pollinated by insects. The 50:50 ratio does not apply in small isolated populations, so when these deviants arise there is a heightened risk of self-fertile inbred plants becoming dominant, gradually weakening the population to the extent that it could become extinct in time.

All in all, the primrose has a lot of insurance – albeit not perfect – to avoid the damaging effects of inbreeding. When you next see a colony of primroses, see if you can spot the pin and the thrum.

At one time there were cowslips in our churchyard but they have long since disappeared. During the autumn we planted cowslips and hope they will become reinstated. Their pollination setup is the same as the primrose and they can potentially hybridise, producing oxslips. Nevertheless, these are not true oxslips, which is a distinct species and another story!

Jubilee tree project

Bothenhampton & Walditch Parish Council (BWPC) wants to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee this year by

planting two trees, one in each community, as part of the national Queen's Green Canopy project. Previously, trees have been planted to celebrate the coronations of George V and George VI as well as Queen Elizabeth II.

After carefully considering several sites, we selected the Howard Road Amenity Site in Lower Walditch, the green space facing the houses on Howard Road in Lower Walditch. This is on public land and can be seen by everybody going past. There are some big park trees in one part of the area, and some sapling fruit trees in another. The council agreed to the tree planting proposal at its meeting on 7 February.

We are conscious from experience that trees can't just be planted and left. People living nearby need to be involved in choosing the most appropriate tree and finding its best location in the green area. Residents are needed not only in this capacity but also as tree stewards to follow its growth and note any damage or disease. The parish council can supply a tree, but it has to be planted firmly, staked, and watered during its first two summers. The one-metre diameter bare earth area around its base needs to be weeded, and mulched annually. From its third year, the tree can be pruned to encourage growth.

We know community projects can succeed, because of the achievements of the Lower Walditch Play Area and Orchard. It is essential for the successful establishment of this tree that people living nearby feel that it is theirs. As a special tree, it could be the focus of family or group celebrations and parties.

Thelma's hymn notes

Were You There When They Crucified My Lord? In his 1899 book Old Plantation Hymns, William

Eleazar Barton wrote that this hymn was most likely composed originally by enslaved African Americans.

In 1940 the American Episcopal Church included this hymn in its church hymnal, making it the first African American spiritual to be included in its hymn listings. However, some English hymn books state that it was originally a folk melody. I have always thought that it was the former. I am fond of these spirituals.

The hymn has been arranged by Francis Westbrook (1904–1975) with music composed by Richard Hey Lloyd (1933–2021). When I was in a village choir, I sang this hymn as soloist at a Good Friday service. *Thelma Pulman, organist at St Mary's Walditch*

Garden tips for March

Prune shrubs with colourful winter stems; prune bush and shrub roses; mulch bare soil in borders; protect fruit blossom against frosts; sow sweet peas outdoors, or plant out young plants raised under cover; sow hardy annuals where they are to flower; plant early potatoes and asparagus; sow vegetables outside; harden off young vegetable plants before putting outside; increase stocks of herbaceous perennials (basal stem cuttings); and propagate shrubs by layering.

St Swithun's Repair & Renewal project

On Wednesday 26 January there was an open Repair & Renewal meeting with Philip Sturrock in the chair. The discussion panel included Crystal Johnson, who we hope will secure funding for the project, and there was a large

group of observers, of whom I was one. The purpose of the meeting was to hear presentations by four architects from Dorchester, Salisbury and in between. It was like a very elaborate interviewing process to begin to decide which architects would be carrying out the project.

On display were some fabulous photos showing these architects' previous work in churches, both in Dorset and further afield including Gloucester Cathedral and a church in Dublin. It almost felt like a guided tour of some of our great examples of church architecture, and it made me want to look at the map and plan a route, jump in the car and explore possibilities that we could incorporate at St Swithun's. To see a photo isn't the same as touching the engraved glass or smelling the various woods; cedar of Lebanon was mentioned as well as oak and beech.

The coastal environment was one aspect considered in terms of materials; for example, brass pegs corode less quickly than steel, and silicon bronze was also mentioned. We were told about St Mary's at Maiden Newton, one of the oldest churches in England still in its original position. Ron Emett, who for many years sustained the Beaminster festival, designed the altar and lectern.

Sustainability was also a talking point. There is a shortage of some materials as well as a shortage of people to do the specialist work. Would the project use recycled glass and local Portland stone? In relation to energy, would we want to keep the memory of the pattern of pew platforms while considering underfloor heating or warm air conduits? The technology of energy is changing fast, and Denmark was cited as a country that's ahead in that kind of design.

The panel also discussed how changing the building would feel in terms of its atmosphere as a spiritual space. How would we maintain a holy place amid such change? To hold on to a sense of combined vision; to gather items in a strong 'statement of significance' to decide what we keep and what we don't. To consider the church arena as a multi-function room where creative events such as concerts and theatre can happen (the word 'god' is included in this latter word: thea = theos = god). How would changes in flooring, ceiling materials or levels alter the acoustics for such performances as well as for regular services of worship? Lighting would also be a feature, not least to light the music scores and text.

St Swithun's is not on the 'at-risk register' of buildings that can benefit from particular funding streams; however, Charmouth church is and that hasn't helped their funding application. The funding will be a challenge, although it may be in our favour that we are the only 'high' church in Bridport. In the words of the woman quoted in Mark 4:3–9, who poured an extravagant amount – a year's salary's worth – of perfumed nard over Christ's head from an alabaster jar, it is to give grateful thanks. We are pushing into the future, providing a community resource for the Allington end of town. Some councils have held competitions for the design of certain aspects, such as the font or altar. A community

survey might take place. Physical and practical accessibility was explored, in terms of design and aesthetics, and communication was also key.

These are some of the considerations that were aired gracefully that day. It felt very

exciting, albeit a touch daunting, too. It will take courage to persevere and hold on to the vision.

I was left with the imagined title for a song or poem: 'Cherries and Limestone'. Pictured above is a stained-glass window at St Nicholas Church, Abbotsbury, which is the first church I have visited since the meeting. I viewed it with refreshed eyes, taking in all that makes up a held, sacred architectural space.
